



## RI CREATES NEW CLUB TRAINER POSITION

To foster the development of leadership skills and increase awareness about Rotary at the club level, the RI Board created a new optional club-level trainer position in November 2006.

After being appointed by the club president, the club-level trainer will work with the club president, the district training committee, the assistant governor, and the district governor to ensure that a club training program is adopted that meets the club's needs.

The club-level training program should include the following:

- Ensuring that club leaders attend district meetings
- Providing consistent and regular orientation for new members
- Offering ongoing educational opportunities for current members
- Creating a leadership skills development program for all members

In addition to the club-level trainer position, the RI Board has also created the leadership development program. This program aims to strengthen the leadership skills of club members. The development program is typically organized by the club trainer, club president, assistant governor, and/or district training committee. The following topics are recommended:

- Communication skills
- Leadership styles
- Leading and motivating volunteers
- Mentoring
- Time management
- Goal setting and accountability
- Strategic planning
- Ethics (Four-Way Test)
- Building consensus
- Teamwork

## SHELTERBOX RESPONDS TO SOLOMON ISLANDS EMERGENCY PDG Dick Elixman

Emergency accommodations for 2,000 people are currently being prepared to be sent to the Solomon Islands by ShelterBox. ShelterBox is responding to the tsunami that hit the islands April 2nd, creating 30-foot high waves that destroyed hundreds of homes along the coastline of the remote island chain. Since the Solomons are in a remote part of the world, ShelterBox will fly the initial contingent of Boxes from the UK to Brisbane, Australia, and then move them on to Honiara, the capital. From this point, it's another 200 miles by sea to the island of Gizo, which is where the heaviest devastation occurred. Initial reports show 22 dead with approximately 5,000 homeless.

The tsunami followed an undersea quake registering 8.0 on the Richter scale. Because of Gizo's proximity to the quake's epicenter, the tsunami struck before an alarm could be sounded, and initial reports from other islands suggest similar or worse levels of damage. With the recent deployment of 600 Boxes to Bolivia to assist flooding victims there, resources at ShelterBox are severely strained.

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## GOVERNOR'S LETTER

I hope that you are reading this newsletter while you are attending the District Conference in Salem. A very large group of Rotarians from all over the District have worked very hard to make this event outstanding in every way.

This is Rotary's first time at the new Salem Conference Center and Phoenix Grand Hotel. This is a state of the art facility, and I believe it will enable us to deliver to the District one of the best conferences in recent years.

We have assembled an excellent mix of Rotary and Non Rotary subjects which we hope will inform you and entertain you as well. PDG Linda Coble, a television personality from Honolulu and one of the first woman members of the Rotary Club of Honolulu, will salute the 20th anniversary of women entering Rotary membership. Rotary Past Vice President William Sergeant, Rotary's point man on the Polio Eradication Project, will bring us up to date on our progress and what the future holds. Rotarians LeRoy Benham and Dr Bob Demuth will educate us on the Rotadent and Rotaplast programs and will outline their impact world wide. MSNBC analyst Rick Francona will discuss the latest events in the Middle East and what the future may hold. Dr John Minahan, the President of Western Oregon University, will discuss what we will need to do to insure that our children will be able to compete in the global economy of the 21st century. Everyone will have an opportunity to meet both the inbound GSE team from District 9790 in Australia and our District 5100 outbound team whom has just returned from Australia. We will see and hear from our 46 outbound and 43 inbound Youth Exchange Scholars. On Sunday, we will take time to remember the wonderful Rotarians whom we have lost in Rotary Year 2006-2007. Again, Mary and I are very grateful for the efforts of so many of you to make this event so professional.

We are now coming down the stretch of our Rotary Year. So far, our record is outstanding. As of the end of March, we were plus 91 new members in District 5100. Overall, our District total membership is now back above 4000. During the last year and one-half, we have chartered three new Rotary Clubs: West Linn, West Columbia Gorge, and later this month, we will charter the North Tillamook County club. All of these membership achievements speak to the overall health of our District.

A greater challenge for us in these last two months is to continue the progress we have made providing support to the Rotary Foundation. When Mary and I were making our rounds of all our clubs, I talked to everyone about Rotary's success in providing support and assistance to the developing world. Our matching grants this year total over \$111,000.00. I pointed out that it was the financial muscle of the Foundation that made us different than other service organizations. I told everyone that "we do what we do because we can". During those speeches, I asked all Rotarians to support the Foundation by making a contribution to the RI Foundation and to proudly wear the "Red Wings" on their pin that said "yes, I will become a "Paul Harris Sustaining member". Through the first 10 months of this year, we are up 20% in giving compared to last year. May and June will be crucial to whether we achieve our goal or not. For those of you who are still considering what you will do, I urge you to join the team and insure that we will do our part to make the world a better place. A fact about volunteer organizations is that the effort

required to achieve success can be daunting. Many times so many of us forget to say "Thank You". This is my chance to say "Thank You" to several individuals whose achievements have been recognized during these last two months. Rotarian Joyce Lockhart was recognized with Rotary's "Service above Self" award by the RI President Bill Boyd during his visit here in March. This award is given to just 150 people world wide each year. Joyce and her husband, Ray, have labored for years providing books, library supplies and other educational materials to the developing world. The Uganda book project has shipped over 6 million pounds of books and supplies to this very needy country. Joyce will again be recognized for her achievement on Saturday night during the Governor's Banquet at the Conference.

Richela Avedon-Grantz, our District Scholarship Committee Chair was also recognized by President Boyd for her outstanding work locating and training our District Ambassadorial Scholars and our Peace and Conflict Resolution Scholars. During the short life of the Peace Scholar program, Richela located five candidates who were accepted for this program. One year she found two totally qualified individuals. Since a district can only have one per year, Richela contacted our sister district to the south and found a sponsor for our second candidate. In recognition of this record, Richela was awarded the Foundations "Citation for Meritorious Service" award. The citation will again be presented to her at Friday noon's salute to the "Women of Rotary".

Lastly, I want to congratulate the 35 clubs in our District that have received this years "Presidential Citation". Each of these clubs achieved a positive membership record and accomplished an event in four out of the five areas of service: Membership, Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service, and International Service.

From February through April, the District not only works to achieve its yearly goals, it also is heavily engaged in the education of the leadership team for the coming year. Each month I have asked the sitting Club Presidents to work with their PE's to insure that we enter the new Rotary Year with highly trained and motivated leaders. DGE Dave Jay, the AG's, District Trainer, PDG Ed Gronke and all of the District staff are to be congratulated on the job they have done. I have attended all of the training, except the International Assembly, and I believe that we are poised to have an even better record in Rotary Year 2007-2008.

We have two very big months to go in this Rotary Year. Let's make them the best two months of the year.

**LONG-TERM IMPACT OF ROTARY WORK CHANGES LIVES**

As we near the end of this Rotary year, it is time to look back and look forward. What have we achieved? What have we done well, and what might we have done differently? What can we consider accomplished, and where will we remain involved in the year ahead?

One of the hallmarks of good Rotary work is that it's never taken on for the short term. Before we begin any project, we think about the impact it will have in one-year, in 10, in 20. We look for ways to provide real help – the kind of help that will truly change people's lives.

Rotary terms of office are only one-year long – a limitation and a great benefit. Allowing each officer to serve only a year at a time allows more Rotarians the chance to lead and the chance to gain a deeper understanding of the workings of their clubs and districts. It also creates a larger base of experience: Past officers can, and should, serve as a resource in their clubs.

In July, we will step aside for another year's class of Rotary officers. But, we will not step aside from our Rotary work. Instead, we will continue to *Lead the Way* in our clubs and our communities, committed to the Object of Rotary and The Four-Way Test, wherever our Rotary work takes us.



**INTERNATIONAL FLAG DISPLAY AT THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE**

The flags displayed around the room represent each of the 170 Rotary countries. They provide a colorful backdrop to a Rotary District Conference and each has historical significance in its design.

Normally, you have to travel to an international convention to see all of the flags displayed as they are introduced to the convention attendees at the opening ceremonies. But, then they seem to disappear. Here, you will have a chance to see them displayed throughout the conference, and you can note the similarities and differences as you reflect on the different cultures involved.

For instance, you will notice that many of the African nations have flags which are taken from the Pan-African colors of red, green, and yellow. The red represents the struggle for independence, the yellow for the natural resources, and the green for the environment, and often represents hope for the future. Among these flags, the flag of Rwanda has a large "R" in the middle of the yellow field to distinguish this flag from that of Guinea which is also a red, yellow, and green flag.

Cyprus has a flag which is unique in that it depicts the outline of this island nation, while the Dominican Republic is the only flag which displays a bible. The flag of Denmark is probably the oldest, dating to the 13th century, although the cross of St. Andrew, the white "X" in a blue field, which is part of the United Kingdom and a traditional Scottish flag is dated back to the 12th century.

The flag of Nepal is the only national flag which is neither square nor rectangular, being composed of two triangles which represent the Himalayas as well as the religions of Hinduism and Buddhism. The flag of the United States is the only truly evolutionary flag in that a star is added when a state is added to the union. There are 28 versions of the stars and stripes since the founding of the United States. The current Canadian maple leaf flag was officially adopted in 1964. Most of the international flags were adopted during the 20th century, but several of the European flags date back to the 17th century.

As you peruse the flags, you can find the name on any particular flag taped to the pole right above the brass joint in the middle of the pole. Please enjoy this display which has participated in at least twenty-five District conferences, the International Convention in Chicago, and four Zone Institutes, as well as numerous non-Rotary and smaller Rotary venues.

Member Access has a lot to offer busy Rotarians. By using this password-protected area on RI's web site, you can register for the 2007 RI Convention, or make club or District administrative tasks as simple as a few mouse clicks.

You can also:

- Donate to the Rotary Foundation
- Manage e-mail subscriptions
- View the *Official Directory*
- Download RI club and District Administration software
- Visit the software support forum

Other tools may be available to you depending on the Rotary office you hold. For example, club presidents and secretaries can:

- Search, view, and update club and District membership data
- Pay club dues
- View Rotary Foundation contribution reports

District Governors can:

- Search and review club and District data
- Access the District Governors Forum
- View incoming officers
- View membership histories

To start using Member Access, you must register. You'll need a valid e-mail address and your district, club, and membership numbers. This registration process allows RI to keep the area's information secure. (Your personal information is safe from unauthorized access, use, or disclosure.) Once you've registered, Member Access prompts you to designate a user name, and a password is e-mailed to you. If you've already registered but have forgotten your user name, a Club and District Support representative can help you. (Find your representative at [www.rotary.org/support/CDAreps](http://www.rotary.org/support/CDAreps).) Your representative or your club secretary can also help you obtain your district, club, and membership numbers.
