10th birthday
this year. Ten
years of
traveling back
and forth, back

between its
home base of
Milwaukee, WI
and its "home

away from home" – Muskegon, MI. In those 10 years, the statistics stagger the mind:

8,000+ crossings at 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours per crossing at 34 knots/40 mph

550,000+ nautical miles (a nm = 6,076 feet on Lake Michigan; a standard mile = 5,280 feet)

2.5+ times the distance of the Earth to the Moon (which is 207,561 nm; 238.855 standard miles)

25.83+ times around the world at the Equator

That's a lot of miles traveled. That's a lot of cars and motorcycles and PEOPLE transported!

What makes the Lake Express go? In simple terms, 4 Detroit Diesel engines, together generating 12,000 horse power powering 4 water jets that help the ship top out at 40+ mph. The amazing thing >>>





'Twas a bit nostalgic for Dave Alexander who watches via PowerPoint presentation an inaugural *Chronicle* front page that introduced the ferry 10 years ago. Dave authored the main article.

>>> about this technological wonder is that its 148 tons only draws 8 feet of water — that means that the bottom of her twin hulls are only 8 feet into the water, making it very easy to float in even the shallowest water.

Its speed coupled with its low profile and catamaran style hull make the Lake Express very stable even in fairly rough seas – a definite plus for the queasy stomachs that might be aboard. The seasoned sailor and those new to cruising the big lake can enjoy two levels of accommodations: The Classic Cabin which offers comfortable seating, large picture windows, on sea movies, and the L'Expresso Café. The Premier Cabin offers steward service, table seating, complimentary beverages, larger seats and electrical service so that passengers' electronic batteries will never run out of juice.

The Lake Express takes the safety of the lake environment as seriously as it takes their passenger safety. They have been awarded the "Travel Green Wisconsin Certificate" while offering sampling services to the Great Lakes Water Institute.

Why does the Lake Express go?

To provide tourists fast and no-hassle travel between the two beautiful states of Michigan and Wisconsin;

To provide business people a relaxing and speedy mode of transportation between Milwaukee and Muskegon/Grand Rapids:

To offer tourists and business people

alike a SHORTCUT – cutting 5-6 hours of gridlock driving down to 2 ½ hours of enjoyable and trouble-free travel.

This decade of reliable service fulfills the dream of founder and owner. Sheldon Lubar (a prominent businessman in Milwaukee). Seeing the tourism and business future of the old freight/car ferries of the 2th century, Lubar worked for years in developing his business plan, waiting for technology to catch up with his vision. Of course, those lifetime residents of Muskegon will remember with fondness, the Milwaukee Clipper – permanently moored here in Muskegon. The Clipper concluded its trans-lake excursions in 1981, leaving a void in this mode of transportation between the two cities for nearly 25 years.

It was clear that many of the Rotarians present for today's presentation were seasoned veterans of the Lake Express. To this reporter, that is testimony to the ship's distinguished past as well as its strong and positive future.
