Rotarians want to serve humanity. But, just like any other organization the two things it must have is people and money, without which very little can be accomplished. August is designated as Membership and Extension month.

For the last two decades membership in USA is dropping about 1% per year. Our district went down from around 1,650 to 1,300. But this hides the reality that we inducted over 4,000 new members and lost 4,400. Only about 825 of these were lost due to death or relocation. If we could have retained even half of the remaining members, our district would be over 3,000 members today.


Our membership committee is compiling a list of iprograms that help retention and new member acquisition. I know many clubs have been trying different ideas, and some clubs have succeeded spectacularly. Tell me what you did to succeed. We will share your ideas with the other clubs.

September is New Generation month. I want to expand our support of young people. Help your Rotaract, Interact and Earlyact clubs. Work with our committees to establish new clubs if you don't have one already. This year we are expecting 9 long term Rotary exchange students. Host and / or sponsor them. Japanese students are already here. Hope you have volunteered to host them.

I am proud to announce that we got TWO public relations grants from RI. One is for a multi-district proposal







(D7210, D7470 and D7490) for WCBS ads, billboards, etc, for \$41,000 and the other is exclusively for our district for Patch ads for \$6,650. These grants are a part of my comprehensive communication strategy to tell the Rotary stories to our friends, neighbors and co-workers. When they see how our service projects improve the lives of people in our own district and around the world, many will be ready to join as members and give money to our causes.

This brings me to improving life in our own district. Our foundation committee has already approved 8 matching grants for \$11,000 each for meeting humanitarian needs in our 4-county area. We are waiting for approval from The Rotary Foundation. In a month or so, we will ask for a second round of proposals. Please . . . please talk to PDG Mike Rabasca BEFORE your submit your proposals and make sure that you meet the Foundation rules.




THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

Support from individual Rotarians in District 7470 pays multiple dividends locally and throughout the world as The Rotary Foundation seeks to address humanitarian issues as part of its commitment to world understanding and peace through improved health, education and humanitarian issues.

A few examples of the matching grants that have been funded for clubs in our district include Morristown Rotary's project to address sanitation in India; Morris Plains Rotary's purchase of oxygenators for the International Children's Hearty Foundation to benefit the Caribbean area; Jefferson Rotary's orphanage project in Romania and Montclair Rotary's recent water project in Kosovo. These are but a few examples of a strong history in our district of reaching out with humanitarian assistance by linking our clubs with Rotary clubs throughout the world.

Locally, we have had strong participation in District Simplified Grants that have benefited many near and far. These grants have aided a day care center in Morris County; purchased diapers for the needy locally and encouraged the provision of

meals in the flood-prone regions of our district where people have been relocated due to local conditions.

EVERY ROTARIAN EVERY YEAR: Now that a new Rotary year has arrived please give thought to becoming a continuing donor to The Rotary Foundation. Every Rotarian Every Year is a goal set by our district to have every individual Rotarian make a personal donation to The Rotary Foundation. This is in addition to the donation made by each of the clubs. You can also do it directly through Rotary International or you can do it through your club. For example, each meeting for twenty meetings you could give an extra \$5.00 to your Treasurer. You would then have \$100.00 to donate to The Rotary Foundation. This would be sent in your name and you would receive credit for it. After you have accumulated donations of \$1000.00, you would nominate your own Paul Harris Fellow. It is this type of generosity that has allowed Rotary to take on a project like Polio Plus. It was originally unthinkable polio could be eradicated in our world. However, with the generous donations of many Rotarians and their efforts in raising funds polio is nearly extinguished in the world which is truly remarkable.

Prospect: "What's in it for me?"

Rotarian: Answer them in this way: "That's a great question, Tom, and let me just say that I know how you feel; I have felt the same way myself. I am already committed 10 expanding my business, after school sports for my son and self improvement courses at the local college; my time is very valuable. But let me just say that what I found OUI was this: by becoming a part of Rotary and giving some of my time, I received so much more back than I could have ever thought possible."

- 12. Time to come together and Celebrate Rotary Through Fellowship and recognize all that has been accomplished for 2012-2013 Rotary Year on a personal level, club level, and district.
- 13. Finally, it is a perfect way to recognize and say THANK YOU to your club president and district governor for all of their efforts and hard work.
- 14. It is time to celebrate with both ceremonies and festivities through fellowship, friendly relationships, companionship, and camaraderie.


