Over 400 Rotarians and partners from 37 Clubs attended the 2012 District Conference in Young.

The numbers attending sessions were around 300 Saturday and 250 Sunday – a wonderful turnout.

RI President Kalyan Banerjee's representative was PDG Bob Richards and Jill from District 9810 in Melbourne.

Bob made the observation that distance travelled between Clubs was one of the major differences between his and our District with most D9700 towns with a Rotary presence being around 75-100km apart where as the entire D9810 was a mere 125km from top to bottom.

Conference speakers focused on the theme of Embracing Humanity and the presentations were combinations of Interesting, Intriguing, Compassionate, Challenging and above all Memorable.

Feedback received from individuals and Clubs indicates

that the speakers and program showed the depth of work undertaken by Rotarians and non-Rotarians both locally and overseas and the outstanding results being achieved.

A Special Feature of the Conference was a Gnome Convention on the Saturday arranged by Jean Simpson to support her partners Program for Street Swags and Water Filters.

A sincere thanks for the wonderful team effort from everyone in support for the 2012 Rotary Partners Program.

The final tally of \$\$\$ raised for Street Swags for the Homeless in our District and for the simple Water Filters for households in the Luro Region of Timor Leste to have safe, drinking water is currently around \$7000.



55 Street Swags have just been delivered and will be distributed according to the donors instructions.

They will keep the homeless people (mainly males) in our district a little warmer this winter.

In talking with welfare agencies, we have been told that they try to place women and children into safe shelters.

There will be around 300 households in the Luro region of Timor Leste, that will have clean, safe drinking water as a result of the water filters.

Without your support, the above humanitarian assistance would not be possible.

Rotary Down Under is the complete

information guide to Rotary in the region.

Rotarians who read Rotary Down Under are well informed and can share this knowledge with their business associates, friends and neighbours.

Effective communication is knowing your product, your programs, your projects.

You can communicate with potential members and those who just want to know what goes on in Rotary.

Ownership

Rotary Down Under is the prescribed official publication and is wholly owned by its readers, the Rotarians who subscribe to it.

During Magazine Month of April, consider how you can best “share” your Rotary Down Under magazine and knowledge – and thereby contribute to our common goal of growing Rotary’s public image.

Our regional magazine is very important and we are so fortunate to have it as a quality resource.

RWMP – Rotary World Magazine Press

The first official magazine The National Rotarian, predecessor to The Rotarian, was started in January 1911 and has been published continuously ever since.

The first regional magazine was issued 1915 in Great Britain and Ireland. There is another official magazine of the Rotary Clubs for Great Britain and Ireland called Rotary Today. This is a bi-monthly publication distributed to each of the 60,000 Rotarians in Great Britain and Ireland at the members' meetings.

The official and regional magazines are circulated to Rotarian and non-Rotarian subscribers. The combined circulation is more than 700,000 copies.

In keeping with April being Magazine

month there are at least two publications with which most Rotarians in our part of the world are familiar – The Rotarian and Rotary Down Under.

Rotary International's unique communications media are the official monthly magazine named The Rotarian published in English language by the headquarters, and 30 other regional Rotary World Magazine Press periodicals that are independently produced in more than 20 different major languages and distributed in 130 countries.

RDU – Rotary Down Under

The Rotary World Magazine Press, of which your official regional magazine Rotary Down Under is a part, is celebrating over 100 years of service to Rotary.

Rotary Down Under is 47 years old this month – a grand achievement!

Rotary Down Under is the ONLY direct link between you as a Rotarian and the RI Board of Directors!

Rotary Down Under is the best resource and educational tool available to you and your Rotary club.

An informed Rotarian is a better Rotarian. Rotary World Press publications are a vital communications link between Rotary International and Rotarians in your District.
