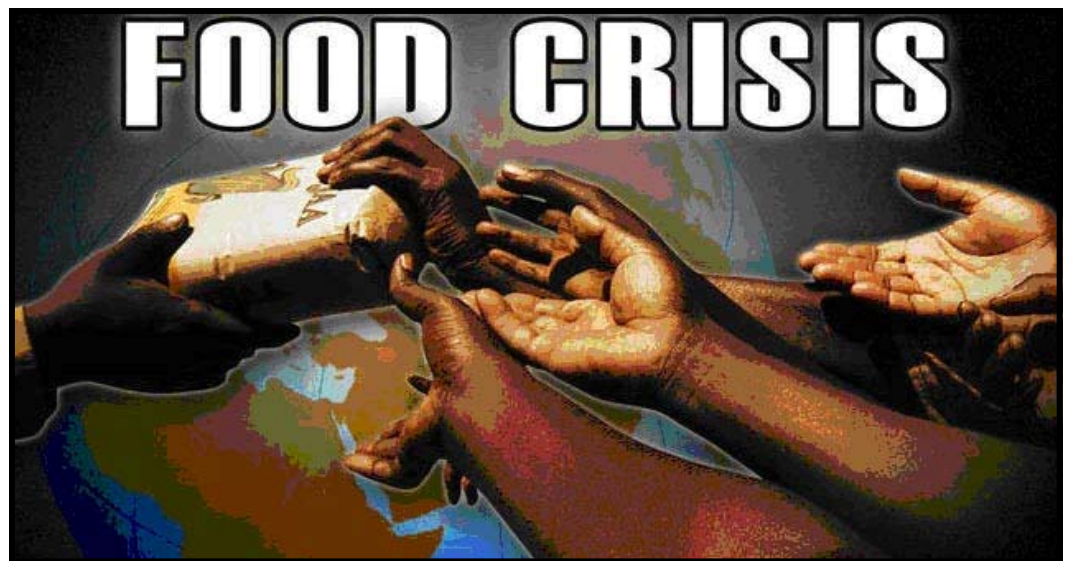

I noted an article in a recent newsletter from the Phoenix Rescue Mission that according to a May survey conducted by the USDA on hunger in America, Arizona now ranks as our 5th hungriest state. Translated to people that means that **every night one child out of five in Arizona goes to bed hungry!** The mission's daily emergency food box distribution has increased as well, from 57 a day in 2007, 98 a day in 2008 to 149 a day in 2009.

Please ask your club members to collect and donate food to your local food banks and food pantries to help our Arizona families in these stressful economic times.

If your club is looking for a project contact the Phoenix Rescue Mission to donate food through the Pack a Sack 4 Kids program. During the school year many children are

fed through the school lunch program but during the summer and even during the school year on weekends their families struggle to put food on the table to feed them. Many food banks have similar programs to supply children with kid-friendly food.

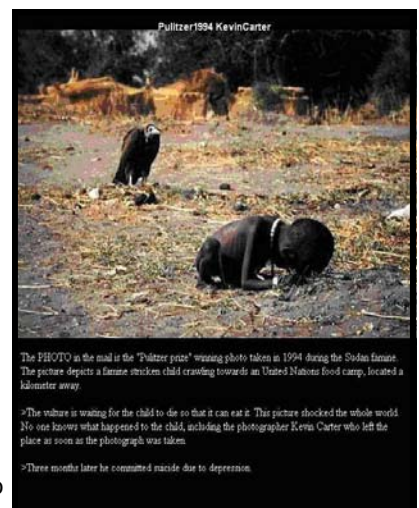

The District 5510 GOALS for 2009-2010

The eradication of polio: Encourage all Rotary clubs to continue their support with a GOAL of \$1,000, and each club raising the awareness within their local community with a PolioPlus fund raiser involving non-Rotarian donations.

District 5510 should strive to reach \$55,100 for PolioPlus which will equal our District 5510 designation.

The District should support an Arizona Awareness Day at the ballpark with the Diamond Backs in September.

Support: The Annual Fund – **Every Rotarian Every Year \$100.** Strive to have 100% participation by the 41 clubs. District 5510 should emphasize an achievement of \$143,000 in total Annual Giving.

The Permanent Fund: Increase the participation of Rotarians becoming Benefactors



and Bequest Society Members.

The Matching Grant Program: Encourage and emphasis to the clubs, the use of DDF towards the six areas of focus of the Future Vision Plan for club international projects.

The Future Vision Plan: District 5510 was not selected to participate in the testing phase of The Future Vision Plan. However, the district will not change its past support of The Rotary Foundation other than our emphasis on the six areas of focus.

The Future of Rotary is in Your Hands – and the future of our Foundation is as well. The District Rotary Foundation **TEAM** stands ready to assist all 41 clubs in reaching their GOALS.

GSE TEAM HEADS TO SCOTLAND ON AUGUST 21ST— READ ALL ABOUT IT!

Welcome to the blog site for the Rotary District 5510 Group Study Exchange to Scotland! Our tentative dates for travel will be 08/21 through 09/22. While we don't have an itinerary yet, the district we will be visiting is 1010 which is basically the entire northeast section of Scotland. If you take a diagonal line northwest from Edinburgh to the Isle of Skye, the district covers pretty much everything to the right of that line.

Our team leader is Ah-watukee Foothills Rotary member, Karen Panietz, an endodontist. Our team members are Scott Turpin, web designer; Levi Coffelt, lead pump technician/water well drilling and pump installation; Kylee Seely, independent hair stylist; Heather Bilodeau, workers compensation claims supervisor; and Caitlin King, non-

profit consultant. If you haven't heard of the Rotary GSE program, it is a cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for non-Rotarians between 25 and 40 years old. The program began in 1965 and is designed to develop professional and leadership skills among young adults so that they can address the needs of their communities and an increasingly global workplace. GSE team members make vocational visits, experience cultural and fellowship opportunities, and share the culture of their home country with the host

country. Check out www.rotary.com if you know of anyone interested in participating in the GSE program!

Our team is busy getting ready for the trip, meeting every other week to learn about Scotland, brush up on our Arizona history, and plan the presentation we will be making to Rotary clubs in Scotland. We are excited about attending the Scotland District conference and the potential to meet the incoming Rotary International president, John Kenny.

So what do you know about

Scotland? the capital city of Edinburgh is the second largest city at a population of about 468,000, while Glasgow just to the west, is the largest city with a population of about 582,000. The total population of Scotland is approximately 5,144,000. The country has over 790 islands and covers 30,414 square miles. The highest point is the summit of Ben Nevis in Lochaber at 4,406 feet above sea level. The longest river, the River Tay, is 120 miles long. Scotland averages about 31 inches of rain a year, and sometimes get 120 inches in the

Highland mountains. Winter averages about 42 degrees, and summer averages 64 degrees. Scotland is about the same size as South Carolina.

How does this compare to Arizona? Phoenix, Arizona's capital, is the largest city in the State with a population of about 1,513,000. Arizona has a total population of about 6,500,000 and covers 113,998 square miles with - sorry to say - no islands except the little uninhabited ones in various lakes! Our highest point is Humphry's Peak in Flagstaff at 12,633 feet above sea level, and

our longest river is the Colorado, running 500 miles from the border with Utah, through the Grand Canyon and down the Arizona/California border to Mexico. The Phoenix area averages 7 inches of rain per year, with our winter temperature averaging 70 degrees and summer averaging 104 degrees. Edinburgh has about the same population as Mesa, and Glasgow has about the same population as Tucson.

And while Scotland may have the elusive Loch Ness Monster (which we do hope to sight on our trip!), Arizona has the equally shy Jackalope hiding throughout our deserts.

Keep checking this site! We'll try to post at least every month until we leave, and then as often as we have time and internet access during the trip.

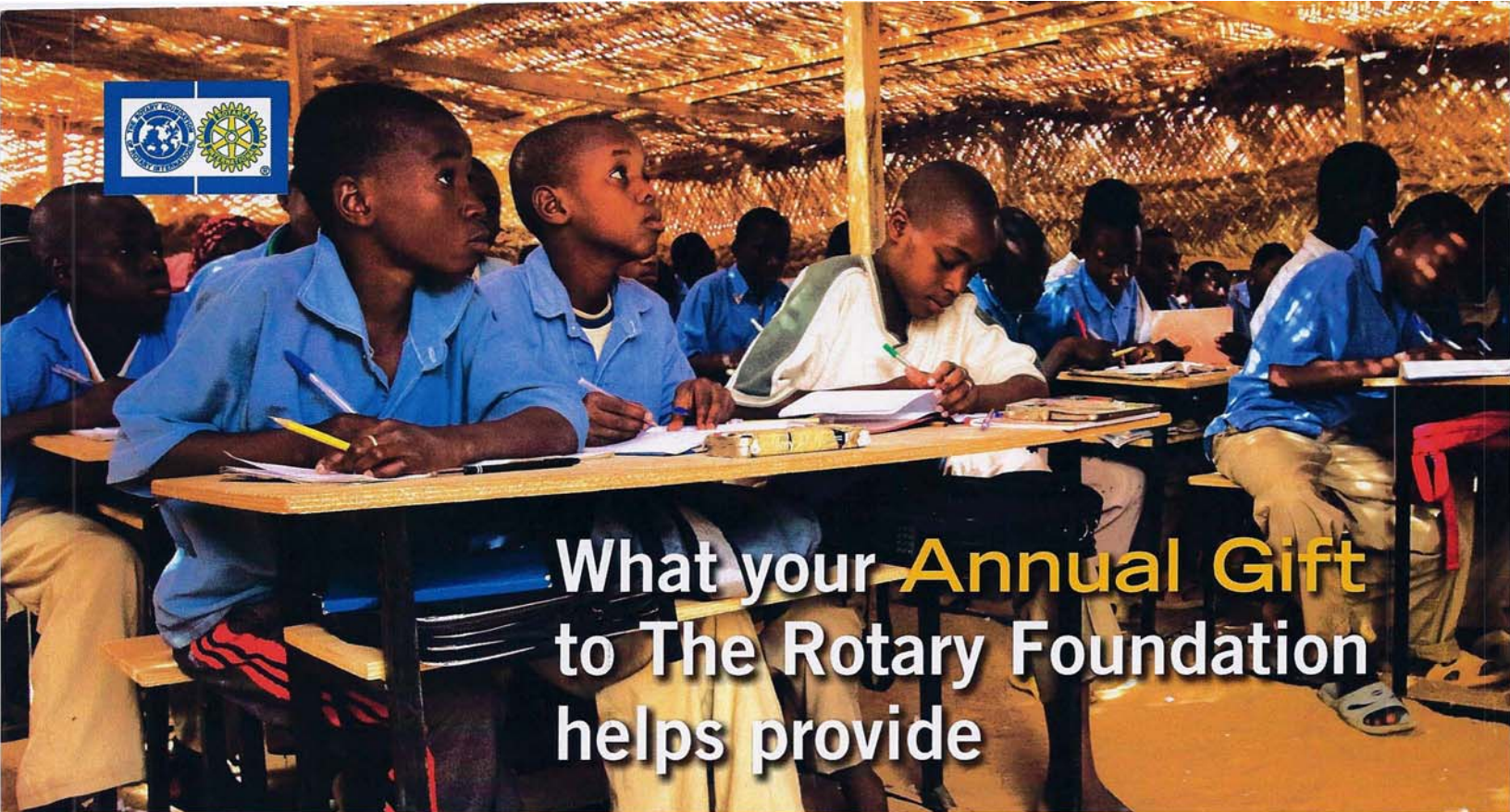

Banner Presentation of Present and Past District Governors 08-09-10

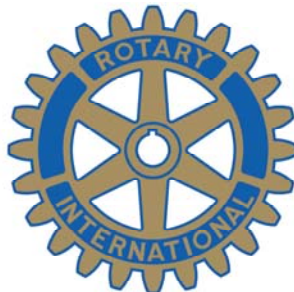
