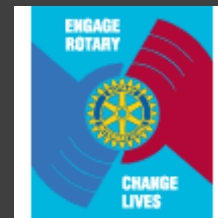

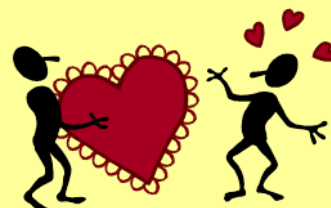

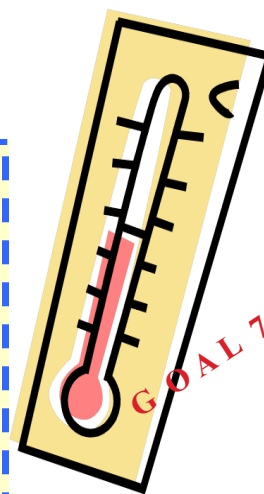

INTERACT & ROTARACT

"**Interact**, a Rotary-sponsored youth service club, was launched by the RI Board of Directors in 1962. The first Interact club was established by the Rotary Club of Melbourne, Florida, U.S.A. Interact clubs provide opportunities for boys and girls of secondary school age to work together in a world fellowship of service and international understanding. The term "Interact" is derived from "inter," for international, and "act," for action. Every Interact club must be sponsored and supervised by a Rotary club and must plan annual projects of service to its school, community and in the world.

In 2006, there were more than 10,500 Interact clubs with 242,000 members in 119 countries. Interactors develop skills in leadership and attain practical experience in conducting service projects, thereby learning the satisfaction that comes from serving others. A major goal of Interact is to provide opportunities for young people to create greater understanding and goodwill with youth throughout the world."

ROTARACT

"Building on the success of Interact clubs for high school-age youth in the early 1960s, the RI Board created Rotaract in 1968. The new organization was designed to promote responsible citizenship and leadership potential in clubs of

young men and women aged 18 to 30. The first Rotaract club was chartered by the Rotary Club of Charlotte North in Charlotte, North Carolina, USA. In 2006 there were 184,000 members in more than 8,000 Rotaract clubs in 139 countries.

Rotaract clubs emphasize the importance of individual responsibility as the basis of personal success and community involvement. Each club is required to complete at least two major service projects each year, one to serve the community and the other to promote international understanding. Rotaract also provides opportunities leading to greater leadership and professional development. Rotaractors enjoy many social activities as well as programs to improve their community. A Rotaract club can exist only when continuously sponsored, guided and counseled by a Rotary club.

The programs of Rotaract are built around the motto "Fellowship Through Service."

Harris' Homilies: Words of Wisdom By Rotary Founding Father Paul Harris

"Rotary, even in its most sanguine moments, has fallen short of realizing its own strength. On no occasion has the cumulative power of all Rotary even been felt. We shall strike a mighty blow some day and we thenceforth shall know ourselves."

"The yearly, daily, hourly spirit of Rotary should be the spirit of the Renaissance. We need men of microscopic visions who will explore the molecules, atoms, and electrons, but we also need men of telescopic vision who will explore the stars."

"It is not the purpose of Rotary to make social, religious, or racial composites of its members."

"There can be no better introduction to the life of a community than one that comes through the local Rotary club."

"Rotary is not an organization for retrospection. It is rather one whose worth and purpose lie in future activity rather than past performance."
